

# Children with health needs who cannot attend school policy

Approved on 1.12.21 by the FGB

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### 1. Aims

This policy aims to ensure that:

- > Suitable education is arranged for pupils on roll who cannot attend school due to health needs
- > Pupils, staff and parents understand what the school is responsible for when this education is being provided by the local authority

# 2. Legislation and guidance

This policy reflects the requirements of the Education Act 1996.

It also based on guidance provided by our local authority

This policy complies with our funding agreement and articles of association.

# 3. The responsibilities of the school

Holmwood School will continue to remotely educate a pupil during any long-term absence.

# 3.1 If the school makes arrangements

Initially, the school will attempt to make arrangements to deliver suitable education for children with health needs who cannot attend school.

- > The making and monitoring these arrangements will be done by the Head Teacher
- > The arrangements could be remote learning pack or referral to Home and Hospital Teaching
- > The Head Teacher will consult with parents and children about the appropriate arrangements

> The Head teacher, class teacher and parents/carers will work together to reintegrate pupils back into school

### 3.2 If the local authority makes arrangements

If the school cannot make suitable arrangements, Middlesbrough Local Authority will become responsible for arranging suitable education for these children.

- > The provision must be suitable. It must reflect his/her EHCP
- > A pupils must be absent for a least 5 days
- > The school will inform the SEN department on the arrangements

In cases where the local authority makes arrangements, the school will:

- > Work constructively with the local authority, providers, relevant agencies and parents to ensure the best outcomes for the pupil
- > Share information with the local authority and relevant health services as required
- > Help make sure that the provision offered to the pupil is as effective as possible and that the child can be reintegrated back into school successfully
- > When reintegration is anticipated, work with the local authority to:
  - Plan for consistent provision during and after the period of education outside the school, allowing the pupil to access the same curriculum and materials that they would have used in school as far as possible
  - Enable the pupil to stay in touch with school life (e.g. through newsletters, emails, invitations to school events or internet links to lessons from their school)
  - Create individually tailored reintegration plans for each child returning to school
  - Consider whether any reasonable adjustments need to be made

# 4. Monitoring arrangements

This policy will be reviewed annually Dennis Ley. At every review, it will be approved by the full governing board.
